The addition of our wheelchair swing and canopy have meant that the yard has more to offer the children through all the seasons.

We are continuing to enjoy our post Ofsted period, although rest assured this does not mean that we are sitting back. We are pushing forward with school development all the time and are excited to be thinking about how we can base this practice and development in further research. I would ask you all to fill in the parent view form online, this can be found by searching for the 'Ofsted Parent View' online, it is a new form that matches the new Ofsted framework. It is a useful way for us to gauge how we are doing and if there are areas that we should be working on.

I am sharing with you the information about a research project that we are supporting. This project is being carried out by the wife of our Chair of Governors, George Murray. The purpose of the project is to validate the use of an online Intellectual Disability Screening Questionnaire. I think that being part of this project would be really helpful, it would give us information about the cognitive ability of our children, this is something that currently we do not have. The information would also be helpful for you as parents when filling in forms about your child/young person and when looking for support as the young people prepare to leave school. I hope that you might be able to get involved.

We have welcomed Mrs Johnson and Mrs Darling back to school and have our newly appointed staff member Miss Lindsay as well.

We have all our Christmas events planned and hope that you will enjoy them as much as we will.

In the new year we intend to start our fundraising drive for our two new vehicles. The old mini-bus is on its last legs and due to changes to the law on who is able to drive a vehicle of this size and weight we have decided to go for two seven seat vehicles. We estimate it will cost us up to £80,000 this is a huge amount of money for a small charity like ours and will take some time to accumulate. We will have to work at this over the coming years and hope that the old bus keeps going in the mean time! We are also applying for grants from different organisations, if we are successful I will let you know.

Validating an online Intellectual Disability Screening Questionnaire for children and young people

We would like to invite you and your child to take part in a project which is exploring how accurate a short screening questionnaire (the CAIDS-Q) is at identifying children with and without an intellectual disability. Children with an intellectual disability have significant difficulties with their understanding, learning and some day-to-day skills. This is called a learning disability or intellectual disability.

Some children and young people who have learning disability have to wait a long time for this to be identified and then fully investigated. In the meantime, they might miss out on support that could have helped them.

Who can take part?

You can take part if you:

- are aged 18 years or over;
- are able to give informed consent;
- have a child aged between 6 and 17 years
- · live in the North East of England


We would like children with and without an intellectual disability to take part.


The study has been approved by the University Ethical Approval system (10698) at Northumbria University.
